Library Resources

Organization of Research Resources

Explain/Discuss Tell students that they can find resource books in a library, including dictionaries to look at word meanings, thesauruses to find antonyms and synonyms, atlases to find maps, and encyclopedias to find information about topics. Show an example of each resource, point out its structure and organization, and show how to use it: alphabetical order in the dictionary, thesaurus, and encyclopedia, tables of contents and indexes for the encyclopedia and atlas.

Apply Tell students that as they do research, they can use these resources. Have students use the resources to look up the word *public* in a dictionary, find a map of their home state in the atlas, and find an article on libraries in the encyclopedia.
